This month we celebrate the Cranbourne turningpoint campus birthday. Each of us has a birthday, a day we celebrate the gift of life God has given us. Thirty years (Pearl celebration) ago Ps Nancy Harkin from South Eastern Christian Centre, (and about the same time Ps Ian Nash from City Life church) planted churches in Cranbourne. It was 3 years later Ps Norma and myself were called of God to take the leadership of the new small church of 20 people. Then a few years later Ps Ian joined us to form what was to become the foundation of CRC turningpoint Cranbourne.

We can now see from the humble beginnings how God has moved, with 7 turningpoint Campuses running in our area, a School of over 1,000 students (with another school planted), Child Care, Properties owned, Australian Bible School of Ministry, Leaders trained, Pastors commissioned, Missions in 17 countries, Bible Colleges in 12 countries, over 1200 churches planted from the Bible Colleges, Children's home, School sponsorships, Pastor sponsorship as our first steps (with much more to come).

CONNECT GROUPS

According to Hillsong Church, Connect Groups are groups of people who regularly meet, talk about life, God, or the Bible, and simply do life together! As a church gets larger and larger, connect groups help individual members of the church to feel connected to other members of the church. They do not feel unnoticed.

Although there are many different models of starting and managing Connect Groups, the following four ways describe how to build effective connect groups, ensuring that every individual is connected:

1. Make it consistent

By meeting regularly to build the trust of the people in the group, develop solid relationships, and journey through life's challenges together. Whether it's weekly or fortnightly on whatever day, make sure that your Connect Group is consistent. Encourage everyone to make a note of it in their calendar, and create the habit of gathering with your Connect Group family.

2. Make it accessible

Meeting at a convenient venue is crucial. Try to be spread out geographically when starting and building new groups, so that people from all over your community can meet at one convenient place to their home or work.

Whenever you meet, make it brief and to the point. It should not take a long time or be an in-depth Bible study.

3. Make it easy for people to fit in

One of the best ways to achieve this is to build Connect Groups based on age groups. This is effective because people can find their peers and connect with people who are going through a similar season of life.

Create a safe place where people can come as they are, where they can feel welcome and accepted, and where they can be vulnerable and open up. It's important that we create a relaxed environment for people to be themselves amongst likeminded people.

4. Make it fun

Have fun! Although reading the Bible and praying for each other is an essential part of a Connect Group, including a variety of activities will help people love it even more. Allow space to enjoy each other's company. Play games, eat food and become friends with each other. Connect Group should be something you look forward to attending, and not become a strain or a chore.

Ultimately, a Connect Group should aim at ensuring that people are discipled and that they are part of the respective church's family. It should be an opportunity for people to be a part of the community, to find solid friendships, support and people to carry on life with.
